Year 6 Open Evenings for Induction to Year 7 in September 2021

I am writing to you today to invite all year 6 students and their parents who are interested in joining us in year 7 in September 2021 to attend one of a series of open evenings here at Netherhall School from the week beginning Monday, 28th September. As a result of the pandemic we are unable to hold our usual open evening, where all prospective students and their parents join us on a single evening, but instead we will host a series of open evenings to ensure safety protocols and social distancing are carefully observed.

This is an exciting time to be joining Netherhall School. Our results at both GCSE and A level were the best in the school's history this summer, with our A level results being officially graded as "Outstanding" and in the top 4% of results in England in this year's Alps Report. The number of students on our school roll has also continued to significantly increase in recent years and we have been thrilled to welcome our largest intake of students into year 7 this September for many years, with 143 students replacing our 102 outgoing year 11 students.

Our year 7 transition to Netherhall School has gone extremely well in challenging circumstances this year and our new students have made a fantastic start to life at Netherhall. We have been joined by students from our largest number of feeder primary schools for many years this year, from 12 primary schools in total, and we look forward to again welcoming students from across the local area to join in our success at Netherhall next year. I have asked a number of our new year 7 students for their views on how they are finding life at Netherhall so far and they have told me the following:

Jessica Courty (from Dearham Primary School): **“At first I was nervous about coming to Netherhall but now I am really enjoying it. Everybody is really helpful and kind and teachers help me find my class when I’m lost. I’m really happy at Netherhall and I think everybody is”.**

Ethan Copeland (from Ewanrigg Junior School): **“I recommend the school to year 6’s coming into year 7 because all the teachers are really kind, the dinners are amazing and the lessons are fun”.**

Aidan Jackson (from Our Lady and St Patrick’s Catholic Primary School): **“When I joined Netherhall I was nervous but everybody has been really nice to me and I love coming to this school”.**

Meya Moore (from Broughton Primary School): **“Everyone is really friendly and the school is easy to get around. The lessons are really fun”.**

Netherhall School A Level Results Rated "Outstanding" in 2020

Alps Report


It is with great pleasure that I write to inform you today that Netherhall School's A level results for 2020 have officially been rated as "Outstanding" in this year's Alps Report, with an Alps Grade 2, and have placed our academic results in the top 4% of all results in England (Alps Grade 1 is awarded to those schools placed in the top 1% in England).

When the class of 2020 joined our sixth form in September 2018, they joined a sixth form that had just secured an "Excellent" rating, Alps Grade 3, in the academic Alps report of that summer, with results placing Netherhall School in the top 20% of all results in England. At our first assembly together, I asked our new sixth form students to take their inspiration from the students of the Class of 2018 who had worked diligently to secure first class results for themselves, enabling their progression to a wide range of impressive career destinations. I am proud to tell you today that the class of 2020 took on that challenge with great determination and have now exceeded the fantastic performance of their predecessors.

While the students were unable to sit their formal examinations in the summer, the body of work they had produced over the course of their 2 years in the sixth form through essay work, coursework, class-based assessments and formal mock examinations meant that their teachers had the depth of evidence required to allow their teachers to accurately submit their Centre Assessed Grades to the various exam boards which have led to their fantastic results this summer.

Netherhall School is immensely proud of the achievements of this summer's year 13 leavers. While their academic results have been rated as "Outstanding", we are also delighted that the students' vocational results have also reached a very impressive standard, with an Alps Report rating of "Excellent" in this suite of results, placing our vocational results in the top 20% nationally.

The result of this first class performance at all levels is that it has enabled our year 13 leavers to embark upon a wide range of fantastic future career destinations; the students'



performance has also provided a great source of inspiration to our record number of 58 new year 12 students, who have been inspired by the tremendous standards set by the class of 2020 and are now determined to maintain and even exceed the performance of our year 13 leavers for themselves and for their school.

Netherhall School would like to congratulate the Class of 2020 for their "Outstanding" performance over the last 2 years and wishes all year 13 leavers all the very best for their future careers.

The EPQ is an independent research qualification that allows students to become skilled and knowledgeable in a topic of their own choosing. Along their research journey, they learn about planning a project, research skills, critical evaluation, academic writing, presentation skills, amongst a plethora of other completely transferable and useful life skills. At the end of September, a few months delayed due to obvious recent issues, six year 13 students completed their final presentations, demonstrating what experts that they had become in their chosen fields.

From building and programming a PLC (Programmable Logic Controller – for those who don't know) from scratch, to researching the effects that social and cognitive psychology have on modern architecture; from considering

why Esports have become so popular so quickly, to exploring how to encourage people to eat a more vegetarian diet for both health and environmental factors. Two other fabulous projects involved exploring how gymnastics can support the physical development of children and how to take landscape photographs with a focus on water. Each project was unique and allowed the students to explore and become widely knowledgeable about something they were passionate about.

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Black History Month

October is officially Black History Month in the UK. To celebrate, Netherhall students have been learning all about influential black Britons from the past during tutor time. A number of red post-boxes across the UK have been painted black to honour black individuals and commemorate their achievements and contributions to society.

A black post-box in London is dedicated to Walter Tull. A professional footballer who played for Tottenham Hotspur, Tull gave up his sporting career to join the war effort in 1914 and having been promoted to the rank of Sergeant, he became the first black officer to lead white British soldiers into battle. At the time, only a white, British-born man could be trained to be an officer. Walter became an exception to this rule and was highly praised for his role in battle, notably for leading soldiers over a river in Italy. Unfortunately, when crossing 'no-man's land', Walter was met by machine gun fire and killed in March 1918.

Students have also been learning about Mary Seacole, a pioneering nurse and heroine of the Crimean War in the 1850s. As a woman and a person of mixed race, Seacole overcame a double prejudice to achieve her goals. In 1854, Seacole travelled to England and approached the War Office, asking to be sent as an army nurse to the Crimea where there was known to be poor medical facilities for wounded soldiers. She was refused. Seacole decided to fund her own trip to the Crimea where she established the British Hotel to provide 'a mess-table and comfortable quarters for sick officers'. She also visited the battlefield, sometimes under fire, to nurse the wounded, and became known as 'Mother Seacole'. In 2016, Seacole was voted first in an online poll of 100 Greatest Black Britons.

The final instalment will focus on a hero of local significance. Born in Cumbria in 1805, John Kent is recognised as Britain's first black policeman and was stationed right here in Maryport in 1835 before joining Carlisle Police two years later. He was known among city residents as "Black Kent" during his service and this nickname was used by adults to scare unruly children. Kent was credited with several arrests. He provided several accounts in his later years, one of arresting two counterfeiters. After arresting one suspect, he handcuffed him to the fire grate in his own house. He left an unloaded pistol with his wife, telling her to shoot the prisoner if he tried to escape. Kent then apprehended the second outstanding suspect. Kent died in 1886 and is now buried in Carlisle Cemetery. A plaque to commemorate Kent's achievements has since been unveiled at the former site of the Maryport jailhouse on Back Brow.

Managing Medication Procedures - Important information for parents/carers



We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students. With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed), as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain, parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs B Johnstone.
