Netherhall School Dancing Stars

Three fabulous Netherhall School students are dancing stars: Abbie Charters, Jodie Ismay and Demi Stoddart have been competing in the highly prestigious Theatre Dance Council International – National Competition.



Jodie and Demi competed in the recent regional competition in Cleveland, where both girls made it through to the semi-finals in tap out of 58 competitors. Jodie was placed 7th nationally last year and was selected for the Theatre Awards for tap and ballet – a remarkable feat considering only 200 dancers were selected from over 7000 dancers! Demi, as well achieving a semi-final place in tap, also achieved a superb semi-final place in modern dance!



Jodie qualified for the final in the Northern Star competition in Blackpool, in which, Demi won the Wildcard entry, singing and dancing in front of hundreds of people. In addition to this, Demi reached the semi-final of the 2017 TDCI modern dance championships. Demi competes all over the country, attending the prestigious 'Can You Dance' conventions with some of the best dance choreographers in the world hold workshops, where Demi was selected to dance on the podium.

Abbie competed in the Pennine Junior Tap Dance Championships, which she won and has qualified for the fourth a row for the Champion of Champions event at Fleetwood, which won last year to be crowned British Tap Dancing Champion for her group. All three girls demonstrate remarkable commitment, practising four days a week at the superb Rumney Greaves Dance Academy in a variety of disciplines: modern, song & dance, ballet, tap, gymnastics, solo, troop, as well as gruelling fitness and conditioning sessions. The girls unanimously paid tribute to their mums and dads for their tireless support and to their inspirational dance teachers, Miss Jade and Miss Denise.



All three girls are brilliant Netherhall School students who are excelling in their academic studies. Jodie is working hard to qualify for veterinary school and would like to continue to dance; both Demi and Abbie's ambition is to follow in the footsteps of former Netherhall School star student Rio Collins to become professional dancers.

The girls are great friends and an absolute credit to Netherhall School, they represent the school in a variety of other sports, activities and are delight to be with. They are champions of Netherhall School.

Young Enterprise 2017-18 - Blazing a Trail!

On Monday, 25th September 2017 a small team of resilience, determination and passion was born.

Nine students attended the meeting, where we began to discuss our life changing experience. Ideas were thrown back and forward, as our centre lead Miss Carter said that no idea was a bad one. We researched all different kinds of marketing, in a search to see what is most profitable and effective to our community. How often is it that you can stumble on a niche in the market - something that isn't currently available? The vast increase of log burners within the UK stood out significantly in our findings. Every one of our nine members feels passionate about our community and helping out in the best way we can. As us Maryport



folk would say "we help our own"; so with no fear of paper cuts or broken nails, the company "Blaze" was formed.

We wanted to create an affordable product which could contribute to heating homes around Cumbria, so we created a fire brick made of torn up newspapers donated by friends and family. The shredded newspaper was soaked in warm water and then compressed together in a brick maker. Our creation was a success and it seemed the locals loved it - our first trade fair before



Christmas was a sell-out and we won the dry run competition between the five teams from local schools. Game on!

We couldn't afford to rest on our laurels as we had to kick our hard working hands and brains in to gear for the competition proper. By the next trade fair in February, the competition in West Cumbria was down to three teams and we had improved our innovative product further by adding a colour changing sachet in the centre of the bricks to give them an amazing colourful flame as they burned. Who were Blaze now? West Cumbria Area Champions!

However, summer was around the corner and we didn't want to limit ourselves to the winter market, so we began to advertise our bricks for BBQs, chimineas and fire pits - we were now able to provide an all year round product. With orders coming in left, right and centre, we couldn't have imagined at the start how many hours of back-breaking hard work would be involved in making the bricks. As champions of the West, we were invited to join other teams from North and South Cumbria at Rheged in March for the County final. Miss Carter and David Davidson, our

business adviser, had always reminded us it is not about the winning, although it is very nice to, and we **really** wanted that winning feeling again. With our redesigned trade stand, improved company report and polished audience presentation, we came away with trophies for best trade stand, best presentation and who were we now? Cumbria County Champions!!

The Blaze family was so excited to be representing the whole of the county and competing now against other teams from the North West of England - Lancashire, Cheshire, Merseyside and Greater Manchester. A 3hr



coach journey on May 10th and we were in Liverpool to show them what the north was made of. Once again our hard working company came away with more awards than any of the other 7 teams - best company report (the last of the big three!) and the Disney award for Creativity!

Unfortunately, at the last moment, the judges decided, awesome though we were, we would not get through to the national final in London. As truly disappointing as the verdict was, and despite the tears, every single one of us walked away with warm hearts and our heads held high as we knew we couldn't possibly have tried any harder. The pride that filled the Blaze family was



unconditional, and we were just more than overwhelmed that we has been so successful to get this far. We would like to thank everyone who helped us along the way. This will be an experience we'll never forget!

Congratulations to Netherhall School's brilliant Young Enterprise team 'Blaze' who secured two awards in the prestigious North West England Young Enterprise finals held at Avenue HQ, Mann Island in Liverpool on Thursday, 9th May.

Blaze secured the title of Cumbria Young Enterprise Company of the Year in the county final held at Rheged, Penrith on Wednesday, 28th March, our Young Enterprise team left school at 7.30am on Thursday, 9th May destined for the North West England finals on the Liverpool waterfront in the shadow of the iconic Liver Building.

The afternoon saw 'Blaze' set up their trade stand to promote the sale of their recycled paper briquettes as they were interviewed by a succession of Young Enterprise judges on the nature of their product, their sales record, their company report and their overall journey throughout this year's Young Enterprise competition.

Following a promising afternoon of interviews 'Blaze' went into the evening group presentations with high hopes and did not disappoint, as Managing Director Lauren Gorge accompanied by Emily Southwell, Jodie Hodgson and Beth Peel delivered a flawless presentation to leave themselves in contention for the final awards.

<u>Netherhall School</u> <u>A Piece of Class Writing by 9X1</u> <u>A Dystopian World</u>

Life had drastically changed throughout the past 30 years. Modern cities had been obliterated and the streets were empty and abandoned. Families that used to have hope and freedom were all of a sudden unable to speak out unless they would be brutally murdered. Before the uprising, life was about earning a living and providing for your family, after, school was no longer necessary and a living could not be earned, but found.

Netherhall School The UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge

The UKMT Individual Maths Challenges are lively, intriguing multiple choice question papers, which are designed to stimulate interest in maths in large numbers of pupils. The Junior, Intermediate and Senior levels cover all the 11-18 age groups. Together they attract over 600,000 entries from over 4,000 schools and colleges.

The Junior Challenge is aimed at students in Year 8 or below. It consists of 25 questions that increase in difficulty. The student has one hour to complete the multiple choice questions using pencil and paper only. They are a test of mental agility and problem solving prowess, under timed conditions. Certificates for Best in Year, and Best in school are awarded, as well as;

The qualifying scores are:

BRONZE 49-60 SILVER 61-74 GOLD 75+ JKANG (UK only) 82+ Marked out of 135.

To recognise the highest performers in the Challenge the top-scoring 40% of participants gain bronze, silver and gold certificates in the ratio 3:2:1

This year Will Cannon (Y8) topped the challenge, with Kieran Hill (Y8) second, and a joint third place for Naomie Morton and Alex Werasko both in Y8. The highest score in Y7 was by Sophie Anderson, with Jack Kemp in second place and Jodie Alderson in third place. The full list of scores is shown below. Unfortunately, this year no-one qualified for the next round, the Junior Kangaroo. Nevertheless these were great results. Well done everyone! Certificates will arrive soon from the UKMT and you will be awarded them in assembly along with a chance to have your photograph on the school website. Get ready for next year, by visiting the UKMT website.

Managing Medication Procedures - Important information for parents/carers

We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students. With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs B Irving.
