Managing Medication Procedures - Important information for parents/carers

We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students. With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs C Savage (Assistant SENCO).

Parent Governor Vacancy

Dear Parent/Guardian

PARENT GOVERNOR ELECTION

I am writing to inform you of a vacancy on the school governing body for a parent governor. Details of the process to fill the vacancy follow.

THE NOMINATION OF PARENTS AS CANDIDATES

Each parent* of a pupil attending the school is to be given the opportunity of putting their name forward with a view to becoming a parent governor. If you want to submit a nomination on your behalf you should do so, in writing, to the Clerk. Letters of nomination must be countersigned by two sponsors, who must also be parents of children currently attending the school. The closing date for the receipt of nominations by the school is Wednesday, 1 March 2017. Please note that incomplete nominations will not be accepted.

In the event of there being no more than one nomination, the person nominated will automatically be elected, unopposed as a parent governor.

THE ELECTION PROCEDURE

If the school receives more nominations than vacancies, an election by secret ballot will be held as soon as possible. Each parent* of a child who at the time of the election is a pupil at the school will be entitled to vote.

In the event of an election, the Clerk will issue all parents with further details concerning the way in which the ballot (which will be entirely secret and as fool proof as possible) is to be organised and supply the official ballot papers.

CANDIDATES' CONTRIBUTION TO THE ELECTION

Candidates will be given the opportunity to write a short statement, which will be circulated to all parents of the school. Should candidates wish to seek support in any other way, this will be entirely their own responsibility.

Following an election, parents will be told the name of the successful candidate.

TERM OF OFFICE OF PARENT GOVERNORS

An elected parent governor will hold office for a period of four years.

PARENTS' PARTICIPATION

It is very important for the efficiency and effectiveness of schools that parents should be encouraged to have an active involvement in their children's education. Consequently, parents are encouraged to participate and take an interest in the election process whether as candidates or voters.

Attendance

As a community school serving the town of Maryport, we aspire to the best possible outcomes for all those young people within our care. Attendance is key to students attaining their full potential. As I am sure you are aware, we run a banding system for clear communication of student's attendance. This is as follows:

Green 95% plus Amber 90 – 95% Red 90% or less

It is vital that all students' attendance is as good as possible and to this end we are set a target figure by the government as a whole school, of 96% or better. Across all year groups we are currently sitting at 94.4%, which is an improving figure from previous years.

We are always looking to work co-operatively with parents and guardians as we are more than aware that sometimes students are ill or have medical appointments. However, I would like to take this opportunity to ask all parents, if you do have to make an appointment for your child, please try to arrange it outside of school time so there is the smallest impact upon their education. If this is not possible, can they please attend either before and/or after their appointment so it doesn't impact upon their attendance figure.

Having good attendance is key to a young person's future, as our Year 11 students are currently finding out. Post 16 training providers all ask for their current attendance as do future employers as part of a reference. A student with attendance of 80% (even though it is a high percentage) means that they had one day off every week and, as a result, would be classified as a poor attender. This could result in an employer or training provider overlooking them at the application stage.

One of our main concerns are those students who fall in to the Persistent Absence category, although this figure is half that compared to the same period last year. Persistent Absence is set by the government as any student who misses 39 or more sessions within a whole school year (with each day counting as 2 sessions, am and pm). We look to identify the reasons for a young person falling into this category and then put in to place appropriate measures to improve their attendance. Interventions that we currently operate include interviews for the students with their Heads of Year, Attendance Officer or the Attendance Lead within school. We also arrange meetings with parents and guardians to work together to support the young person to improve the situation. As always, we rely upon a close and positive relationship with home to ensure that all of our young people have the best possible education and outcomes for their future.

I would like to also make you aware that students now have a monthly attendance tracker in their diaries. If you have any concerns or questions about your child's attendance, please do not hesitate to contact school at your earliest convenience.

Year 11

There are only five months until the beginning of the Year 11 examinations. This is a seminal time for Year 11 students, a culmination of eleven years of compulsory schooling. The examinations are an opportunity for every student to demonstrate their capabilities, attain and give themselves genuine choices for their future. The key word in the previous sentence is 'their', this is 'their' time – all students in Year 11, to do 'their' best and set themselves for 'their' future.

In my experience, success is rarely achieved as a lone endeavour; it is best achieved through teamwork. In this case, I believe success for each student will be achieved through joint endeavour, the partnership between teachers, students and parents.

It is vital that students go into these exams well prepared, confident and assured they have done everything possible to secure the right outcome. I recently met with all Year 11 students and parents; the purpose of the meeting was to make explicit the actions which will best serve Year 11 in their examinations. At risk of stating the obvious the key points were:

- Attainment and attendance are directly related. If you are in lessons, you have a chance to learn. The only attendance worth striving for is 100%.
- Attainment and effort are directly related. The maxim 'We get out, what we put in' is a useful truth.
- Attainment and behaviour are directly related. Positive considerate behaviour supports the attainment of everyone in the class.

The second purpose of the meeting was to set out the school's actions for the next five months. As part of this I am delighted to state that the school has instituted an extra lesson at the end of each school day for all Year 11 students. Fourteen of the school's most highly experienced and skilled teachers have volunteered to deliver a timetable of extra classes from Monday to Friday, every school week for the lead into the Year 11 exams. For me, it demonstrates an absolute commitment by the school to the young people of Maryport, as one would expect, parents and students alike are truly appreciative.

It is also worth commenting that Year 11 students' attitude toward the prospect of an extra hour of lessons has been nothing short of brilliant. I have made it clear that all students have to attend lessons by their own volition, with the right attitude and effort. The only conversations I have had with students and parents, is about students wishing to join extra after school classes. It is evident that there is no shortage of aspiration and endeavour in Maryport, with this level of commitment and teamwork, I believe they will fully realise their potential.

National Citizen Service



Netherhall School selected as a Champion School by National Citizen Service

- Netherhall School has been awarded 'Champion School' status by the National Citizen Service (NCS) due to its commitment to the youth programme to date.
- Over the last 5 years, over 200 of our pupils have graduated from NCS.

We have been named a 'Champion School' after being selected from thousands of schools participating across the country by National Citizen Service, the UK's flagship youth programme for 16 and 17 year olds. The school has excelled at motivating students to take up extracurricular activities, specifically encouraging young people to attend the programme at the end of their GCSE studies in Year 11.

NCS teenagers meet other young people from different schools and take part in 3 different activities. The first is outdoor based, where they learn about interpersonal, team work and leadership skills. The second is a residential, where as a group they have to manage a budget and themselves during that week. This culminates in the final element where they stay in university style accommodation while they learn more about their community and how they can make a difference through social action projects. Following this, the young people spend 30 hours dedicated to executing their own social action campaign in the local community.

As a school, we really value the experience our young people gain from taking on the challenge of participating in the NCS programme and we look to encourage all students to take part. We have seen those who have taken part in the programme increase their maturity and confidence, which is a huge benefit to them post 16.

We feel that it's a great achievement to be given "Champion School" status. We highly value the program and the opportunities and skills that it offers our students which have been reflected by the amazing feedback we receive from our students, and the noticeable difference we see in their attitudes when they return from the programme.

On NCS, our students are taken out of their "comfort zone", meet and work with people from different backgrounds, take on new challenges and, perhaps most importantly, learn about the community and how they can make a difference. This means that not only do young people return more confident, resilient and eager to learn, they are often much more eager to volunteer and help out in their local community."

National Citizen Service is a four week programme for 16 & 17 year olds which takes place during school holidays. The programme, which UCAS recommends on personal statements, helps teenagers develop skills for work and life including confidence, leadership and resilience, whilst also expanding social networks.

Our current Year 11 students will, very shortly, be given the opportunity to take on the challenges of the NCS program and reap the rewards too. We will be actively encouraging them to become involved, sign up and make that commitment.

Sixth Form

It has been a highly busy and exciting period in the Sixth Form block. The Sixth Form Centre has been fully refurbished, decorated and carpeted throughout with a brand new kitchen installed. This has left us with a highly professional working environment and I would like to thank the site staff and painting contractors for a first class job.

In other news, we have been active in our recruitment to the Sixth Form for 2017-18 and have visited Solway School, Silloth, Beacon Hill at Aspatria, St Joseph's at Workington and attended the Post-16 careers fair at Workington Leisure Centre to advertise our Sixth Form. I would particularly like to thank Leah McArdle, Lewis McDowell, Declan Thompson and Kim Scott for their help in this process. They represented our Sixth Form student body with distinction and have played a huge role in helping boost our numbers for the forthcoming academic year.

This term has seen us set up a program of 'supervised study periods' and I would like to thank both staff and pupils for their positive attitude and co-operation in this initiative. It will come as no surprise that the old maxim "you get out what you put in" lies behind this program. With only 3 months left until the exam season it is our intention in the Sixth Form to make the most of our talents and opportunities in the time that remains to ensure first rate results this summer.

With regards to opportunities and community support, I would also like to praise our Sixth Form students for the wonderful job they have done this term in their roles as Sports Prefects where they have given freely of their time to support lower school pupils at lunchtimes. I would also like to praise Sixth Formers for their work in support of literacy and numeracy with pupils in Years 7-11, in their work in partnership with local primary schools and in their work experience commitments. The students are a credit to the Sixth Form and have much to be proud of.

Looking forward to the next term we will again have much to enjoy. Sixth Formers will benefit from revision study skills sessions in the continued build up to their public exams and Year 12 students will have the opportunity to apply for summer school courses at various universities, including those run by the Sutton Trust. We will also find out if Lewis McDowell has been successful in his application to read mathematics at the Oxford University summer school and we wish him well with that.

All in all this has been a highly memorable half term within the Sixth Form. I would like to thank all Sixth Form students for the warm reception I have received upon my return to Netherhall School. It is my great privilege to work with such a talented and hard-working group of young people and I look forward immensely to the opportunities and successes that lie ahead. I wish all Sixth Form students a restful and well-earned half term break and look forward to another fantastic session after the break.



NEWYORKCITY



Prayer Station

Guitar Lessons

We have had the most fantastic opportunity to have Miss Adamson join us in the music department. This has allowed us to take advantage of her skills as a guitarist, which has enabled all students in Years 7 and 8 to take part in guitar lessons. 52 students have taken advantage of this opportunity and have made significant progress in developing their skills as guitarists.



Students have been learning the appropriate posture and technique when playing the guitar. Using themes from films such as 'Harry Potter' and 'I'm a Believer' from *Shrek*, everyone has learnt how to read tablature, a form of guitar music notation. Recently, students have learnt how to read chord diagrams in order to play well-known songs such as 'We Will Rock You', 'Say Something' and 'Hall of Fame'. Many of these songs only use two or four chords! They will shortly be learning more about music notation and learning to play a piece that everyone can play together as a guitar ensemble.

The students have really enjoyed their lessons and have made comments such as: "Playing the guitar is hard work but Miss makes it fun and interesting"

"the lessons are really good fun" and "it's really fun learning this new skill, I want to learn more and get better".


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
