Dear David & the Students and Staff at Netherhall,

My colleagues and friends are no doubt bored of hearing about "the amazing school in Cumbria I visited on Friday." I have been talking about it pretty much without pause since returning. I wanted to thank you all for your warm welcome, and more importantly for making such a valuable contribution to the lives of the students in your community.

#### A few things I noticed:

- students are, to a person, incredibly proud of their school. This is evident in their feedback to me, but also in their presence throughout the school and even walking towards the school in the morning. I didn't even see a piece of litter on the floor a real sign that they care for that space.
- students with special educational needs seem to be warmly embraced throughout the school. Students understand their unique character traits, and you can tell there is an element of taking care of each other, which is a hard character trait to cultivate.
- staff, too, seemed rightfully proud of their school. Everyone I spoke to had some success to share with me, or some piece of work to proudly point out.
- the SEN resource area was a friendly, inviting place. Students clearly feel that they have a "home" there and that it's a safe place from which to start their days. Staff are deeply empathetic, understanding their unique learning needs (both social and academic) and effortlessly guiding them in their learning.

I was genuinely amazed at how polite, well-mannered, and respectful every student was. I loved how relaxed the Year 11s all seemed to be - wearing their leavers' jumpers with pride, not at all phased about being in the throes of public examinations.

I have to give some special shout-outs to a few students, hoping they make their way onto the board for Friday Forum:

- Nathan Hadley, for the most efficient and comprehensive tour of a school building I have ever had!
- Taylor, for his wonderful conversation, while he escorted me between lessons.
- Joshua, again for his welcoming conversation but also for his clear, deep knowledge of climate change!
- Adam, for working so hard in maths (reading and writing pictograms) and for his lovely conversation, asking lots of good questions.
- Kieron, for showing off the school garden knowing it's a work in progress! (I asked him to show me the piece of work he was most proud of, and next thing I knew I was in the garden, watering onions and cauliflower). (NB: David, please buy a new garden hose and sprinkler for the garden!)

## Sixth Form trip to New York City Monday 8th to Friday 12th July 2019

Netherhall School Sixth Form students have just returned from our second visit to New York City this year, with 31 Year 12 students enjoying a fantastic time in the 'Big Apple'. Having departed from school at 7.45am on Monday, 8<sup>th</sup> July we travelled to Manchester Airport, where we checked in for our flight with Virgin Atlantic to New York's JFK Airport. Our connection into Manhattan saw us arrive at the Heritage Hotel, Chelsea, at 6.30pm New York time, and an hour later we headed up to the Empire State Building, where the views afforded were outstanding. Our evening meal followed, at the 1950's style Tick Tock's diner, before we headed back to the hotel for a much needed sleep.

Our first full day in New York on Tuesday, 9<sup>th</sup> July was packed with activities, starting with breakfast at the Heritage Hotel, which was topped off with birthday cake to celebrate the 17<sup>th</sup> birthday of Jack Brown; we then headed to the Guggenheim Museum on Fifth Avenue, where we saw many priceless works of art. A guided tour of the Radio City Music Hall followed and we even had our photos taken with one of the famous 'Radio City Rockets' dance troupe. Following a visit to McDonalds on 42<sup>nd</sup> Street, we headed to the Circle Line Boat Tour around Manhattan, which took us up to the Statue of Liberty and underneath the Brooklyn Bridge, providing us with some fantastic photo opportunities. A visit to the world's largest department store, Macy's, followed, before we headed for our evening meal at the Hard Rock Café and some free time in Times Square, before we once again retired for the evening.

Wednesday, 10<sup>th</sup> July saw a guided bus tour of Manhattan, where we visited the Cathedral of St John the Divine, Columbia University, Central Park and Fifth Avenue, before we were dropped off at the Financial District in lower Manhattan, where we had an excellent lunch at George's Diner. During the afternoon we visited the 9/11 memorial museum which proved to be a highly moving and informative experience. The evening was spent watching King Kong on Broadway, which was outstanding, before our evening meal at Ellen's Stardust Diner off Times Square and a return to our hotel for a much needed sleep at half past midnight.

Year 12 students were up early on the morning of Thursday, 11<sup>th</sup> July with a 7.30am departure from the Heritage Hotel and a subway ride to Brooklyn for breakfast at the Park Plaza Diner, which was

again topped off with 17th birthday cake, this time for Abigail Knowles, before we walked into Manhattan across the Brooklyn Bridge; this proved to be a fantastic experience with outstanding views. We then visited the Grand Central Station to take some fantastic photos at one of the world's most iconic railway stations, the sheer scale of the main concourse taking the students' breath away. Following this, we headed down Fifth Avenue to spend a couple of hours shopping at world famous stores such as Tiffany's, before we sadly had to return to the Heritage Hotel for the bus journey back to JFK Airport to begin the long journey home.

We arrived back at school at 11.30am on Friday, 12th July exhausted, but having had the trip of a lifetime. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs Stead for her support on the tour, and I would also like to pay tribute to our brilliant Year 12 students for their fantastic conduct and company on the tour. They are a great credit to themselves, their families and our school.

## Young People's Hero Jamie-Lea Wright receives The Diana Award in London

It is with immense pride that I write to inform you that on Monday, 1st July at a ceremony in London, Year 13 star student Jamie-Lea Wright was one of 85 inspirational children and teenagers who received The Diana Award, given in memory of Princess Diana. This is awarded to outstanding young heroes who are publicly honoured for going above and beyond in their daily lives to create and sustain positive change. This award is the highest accolade a young person can achieve for social action or humanitarian efforts.

At the age of 14, Jamie-Lea first became involved with The Children's Rights Alliance for England, identifying the forty most important issues affecting children. The report the team produced was submitted to the United Nations and Jamie-Lea was then invited to Switzerland to give a presentation to the United Nations. Jamie-Lea was then selected as one of two representatives from England to participate in a six hour interview with many key organisations and officials, including the Head of UNICEF (the United Nations Children's Fund), the UNRC (Convention on the Rights of Children), Save the Children and the Children's Commissioner for England, Anne Longfield OBE.

The conclusions reached were sent as recommendations to the UK government to improve the lives of children and Jamie continued her crusade as part of the national team who communicate with children's charities, MP's, social workers, councils and the government to ensure a better life for all children.

Jamie-Lea is an exceptional student in all respects and is predicted to achieve a triple Distinction\* in health and social care this summer, before going on to read for a degree in social work at the University of Cumbria in the autumn. She has made significant contributions to the life of Netherhall School during her time in our sixth form and has made notable contributions to our paired reading program with lower school pupils and in providing lesson support to the Health and Social Care Department in lower school lessons, while she has also been a key member of the Sixth Form Council and contributed to many charitable works over the last few years.

Jamie-Lea's teachers are unanimous in their commendation of this outstanding young lady and believe "Jamie-Lea is a first-class student, amazing young person and inspiration to all students of Netherhall School". Jamie-Lea is incredibly modest about her achievements, simply seeing her actions as her moral duty. The staff and students of Netherhall School are of the opinion that the trustees of The Diana Award have been absolutely correct in their judgement, that Jamie-Lea Wright is indeed a hero and that she absolutely represents the very best of Netherhall School and Maryport. Congratulations, Jamie-Lea, on all that you have achieved and will go on to achieve. You are very much a true inspiration to us all.

# Rebecca Woods and "We Will" visit the Houses of Parliament

Year 12 student Rebecca Woods, a leading member of the "We Will" campaign group, has recently returned to school following a visit to the Houses of Parliament in London on Wednesday, 22<sup>nd</sup> May.

"We Will" is a group of young people aged 14-18 based in Maryport, who have the aim of reducing the stigma surrounding mental health issues. The group aim to bring awareness around the lack of provision surrounding mental health and are campaigning to improve this situation. Over the last two years the group has made three films to raise awareness and has trained over 400 people in YMHFA (Youth Mental Health First Aid), including some of our own sixth formers at Netherhall School. The group has made strong connections with Sue Hayman, MP for Allerdale, Lord Campbell-Savours and other senior public health officials, doctors, counsellors and many more, in their quest to improve mental health provision.

"We Will" attended the Golden Apple Awards at Carlisle in 2018 and won the award for "Best Community Initiative" before going on to the Community Hero Awards in 2018, where they won "Best Youth Project". Following this success, the group have been interviewed by BBC Look North, Radio 5 Live, Border TV, CFM, BBC Radio Cumbria, the TES, and have featured in a full page article in The Guardian alongside appearances in Italian and American newspapers; they have even made an appearance on German TV!

Rebecca is a fantastic young lady in all respects, a great credit to our sixth form and an inspiration to her peers. She is studying for A-levels in business, IT and RE and has a very bright future ahead of her. Upon her return to school Rebecca reported: "Visiting Westminster was one of the best experiences of my life. I had the opportunity to chair the two meetings we held in the Houses of Parliament with Jackie Doyle-Price, Minister for Mental Health and Barbara Keeley, Shadow Minister for Mental Health and they have assured us that they will do all they can to support us in raising awareness of this highly important issue".

Netherhall School is immensely proud of Rebecca and all the other members of the "We Will" group who are fantastic ambassadors for the town of Maryport. As Rebecca told me: "Have the courage to talk, have the courage to listen... No one is alone". # The UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge Stanley Routledge

The UKMT Individual Maths Challenges are lively, intriguing multiple choice question papers, which are designed to stimulate interest in maths in large numbers of pupils. The Junior, Intermediate and Senior levels cover all the 11-18 age groups. Together they attract over 600,000 entries from over 4,000 schools and colleges.

The Junior Challenge is aimed at students in Year 8 or below. It consists of 25 questions that increase in difficulty. The student has one hour to complete the multiple choice questions using pencil and paper only. They are a test of mental agility and problem solving prowess, under timed conditions. Certificates for Best in Year, and Best in School are awarded, as well as Bronze Silver and Gold.

This year, Stanley Routledge (Y8) topped the challenge, with Leo Beales (Y8) second, and Jessica Henderson (Y8) third. All three are awarded Bronze certificates. The highest score in Y7 was by Nevaeh Ndubuka with 40, who was awarded the certificate for being best in the year group.

#### Managing Medication Procedures - Important information for parents/carers



We recognise that from time to time students may require medication within the school day. However, we do have to adhere to guidelines to ensure the safety of our students. With this in mind, we would like to point out some procedures that we must follow:

- Some students may need to take prescribed medicines during their time in school. This will usually only be for a short time period, e.g. to finish a course of antibiotics. Parents/guardians must come into school and arrange this with reception.
- Children should not be sent to school with their own medicine (prescribed or non-prescribed) as this poses a health and safety risk to other children.
- Staff will not administer non-prescribed medication i.e. paracetamol, unless there are exceptional circumstances and where there is specific prior written permission from a parent/guardian.
- If a child suffers regularly from frequent or acute pain parents should refer the matter to their child's GP.

Parents/guardians have the prime responsibility for their child's health and should provide the school with timely, complete information about their child's medical condition. If your child has a medical condition that we do not know about, please contact the school, your child's Head of Year or Mrs B Johnstone.

#### The story:



### **Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award**

### Netherhall Go Ride Summer Challenge

Based on the success of last year's Summer Cycling Challenge, the Netherhall Go Ride club set a longer and more difficult challenge this year. The route took pupils from the coast at Maryport across Hadrian's Wall using route 72, and finished in Tynemouth covering a total distance of 120 miles.

14 pupils took up the challenge to help raise money for the Great North Air Ambulance and for new bikes, to aid more pupils to get involved in cycling. These were: Blake Wassell and Ciaran Nicholson in Year 7, Ciaran Booty, Ashtyn Skillen, Lewis Moore, Jack Kemp and Dan Chilton in Year 8, Ross Pantling, Leo Thompson, Danny Dryden, Ben Stewart, Regan Wilson and Kelsick Little from Year 9 and Tyler Beales of Year 10.

All of the pupils showed excellent resilience, teamwork and commitment during the ride, battling against rain, wind and very steep hills.



Day 1 was a very wet day with some dry spells at times. The route started at Maryport harbour then along the coast to Allonby and off to Abbeytown for lunch. After lunch they went on to Bowness on Solway marking the official start of Hadrian's Wall. From here the ride went on to Carlisle and our first camp site, with dinner at Shanghai Shanghai, all went to bed with a very full stomach.







Day 2 was supposed to be wet but instead we had to break out the factor 50 sun cream. The day began in Carlisle and finished up in the high hills of Haltwhistle. The day started quite flat but soon changed once we reached Lanercost Priory and climbed the long hill to Banks Turret giving us our first view of Hadrian's Wall. Continuing to Birdoswald Roman fort, then Gilsland and Greenhead up the climb to the Military Museum. After the hills there was a fantastic descent down to Haltwhistle, but all good things come to an end and the day finished with a 1.5 mile climb, with sections of up to 16% to reach the camp site. All the boys gave it their best shot, but Mr Fulton managed to take the King of the Mountain jersey from Ross (but only just). During the evening the group were taught how to use the camping stoves by Mr Wassell and then cooked themselves their own 4-star meals before bed.











Day 3 was supposed to be thunder, lightning and heavy rain, and at one point there was a concern that we might have to abandon the ride, however, once again we got lucky and the sun cream was brought back out. With the long, hard and hilly days behind, we were pleased to have a short day at only 22 miles and one hill to climb. The climb came early in the day and led to an amazing 6 mile descent down the very straight Staingate Road where some pupils achieved speeds of 35mph. The route went on into Hexham and finished at the Roman town of Corbridge. The camp site was situated next to woods and rivers and the group had a great time playing manhunt and some even got a 1 to 1 chess master class with Mr Blades.









Day 4 was again sunny, much to the surprise and joy of the group. With a climb out of Corbridge being the most difficult part of the day, the group were on their way. We headed down to the River Tyne and on to Newcastle, passing landmarks like the birth place of George Stephenson as well as the Tyne and Millennium Bridges. Finally, just 4 miles from the end we stopped at Segedunum, now known as Wallsend. This marked the last fort end of Hadrian's Wall and the first of our achievements. After a few pictures to prove we had completed the wall we headed off to Tynemouth to complete our coast to coast. We arrived at the harbour ahead of schedule, greeted by blue sky, sunshine and dolphins playing in the mouth of the Tyne. After a well-deserved fish and chips, it was time to pack up and head home.















It was also nice to see them improve their confidence and ability on the bikes, especially Ross Pantling, Danny Dryden and Tyler Beales, who showed excellent leadership both on and off the bikes. By the end of the trip all pupils were able to put up their own tents and take them down again and cook their own food and clear up without any help.



Overall, the trip was a massive success, we watched the team grow and improve each day. I hope the pupils enjoyed the ride as much as the staff did. Hopefully, we will see them all back again next year for the next challenge. Well done to all involved.
